SPECIAL EDUCATION

Toyon Middle School is proud of its Special Education programs, which include our resource and special day class settings. Resource Specialists assist qualified students in accessing and learning the challenging core curriculum established by the Calaveras Unified School District, aligned with California State Standards.

HOMEWORK CLUB

Homework Club is available to students **most** Mondays through Thursdays from 3:15 to 5:30 P.M. The purpose of this opportunity is to provide students a quiet place to work on homework, projects, or any school assignment(s). A credentialed teacher is available to assist students who need help with an assignment or who may need additional assistance getting started on a project.

Students must have a permission form on file to attend. Permission forms are available in the school office. Students must sign up in the office by the end of **Morning Break each day** they plan to attend Homework Club. This ensures proper teacher staffing for the number of students attending.

A late bus is available at no charge to students attending Homework Club. Late bus passes are available from the Homework Club teacher. Parents may contact the district transportation department for late bus stops and times at 754-2178, as they may be different than the regular bus routes.

STUDENT SUCCESS TEAM

Toyon Middle School has an active Student Success Team (SST) that meets regularly to discuss academic and behavioral concerns with parents and their child. Members may include a site administrator and/or classroom teachers. These members, along with the parents and the student, discuss problems occurring at school that hinder success and develop strategies to improve academic performance and/or increase appropriate student behavior.

A site administrator, classroom teacher, parent, or student may initiate an SST meeting. Please call Sherry Matison, Doug Clark, Susan Bratset, or Jep Peckler if you think such a meeting would benefit your child. All may be reached through the school office at 754-2137.

CO CURRICULAR

Some classes have activities on which students are evaluated outside the "normal" school day (such as band and choir). Academic probation does not restrict participation in these activities.

ATHLETICS

To participate in athletics, students must:

- * have no "F's
- * demonstrate good citizenship
- * have health insurance (information about student health insurance available in the office)
- * maintain a 2.0 G.P.A. (based on posted grade reports, 8 per year)
- * have "at standard" attendance (92% or better)

Offerings include basketball, wrestling, volleyball, cross country, and track & field.

Students must be in school on athletic event days.

If grades are posted during the middle of a season and a student/athlete cannot meet the eligibility requirements, the student/athlete is no longer allowed to participate in the after school sport.

ACTIVITIES

Students with outstanding grades, behavior, and/or attendance will be rewarded. Toyon students are welcome to attend activities except those who:

- are on academic probation*
- have an activity restriction*
- did not attend school on the day of the activity (or the day before an all-day activity)*
- have less than 92% attendance*

Parents are encouraged to participate in activities as chaperones. Chaperones will ride the bus (if activity is off campus), be "in charge of" a small group of students, help supervise, etc. Please notify the office if you are able to participate.

Signed permission slips (and fees, if any) are due before the activity. Parent notes and/or phone calls will not be accepted in lieu of the original permission slip. Each deadline varies but is generally within one week of the activity. Except in the case of illness, there are no refunds after the due date deadline.

Enjoyment and safety are our primary concerns. Therefore, each participant and his/her parents will agree to abide by special activity guidelines.

While on a Toyon field trip, students represent Toyon Middle School and the community. Therefore, we expect their behavior and actions to be positive reflections of Toyon students. All District and Toyon rules apply to students while participating in the activities. It is the responsibility of each participant and his/her parents to read the Toyon handbook to become familiar with the rules and expectations. Any breach of the rules will result in students being excluded from **all** future field trips **and** extra curricular activities for the remainder of the year. If the offense takes place during an end of the year activity, the consequence will carry over to the following year. The consequences for field trip and activity violations will include a mandatory 5-day suspension **and** 20 hours of "community service."

If a law is broken, the offender(s) **will** be turned over to the local police.

The special field trip rules apply to **all** students participating in the activity **and** any witnesses to the offender (I.E. students who know a rule is being broken or witness a rule being broken and choose not to report it).

The drug dog may search students' possessions before each off campus trip.

RENAISSANCE REWARDS

A student with a GPA of at least 2.0, attendance at or above 92%, with no discipline points will be rewarded with a "renaissance reward card" allowing the student some extra privileges and eligibility to attend a "reward day." Students who do not qualify one quarter may still earn eligibility the next quarter. There is some cost for attending the activity, and some scholarships are available for those students unable to pay.

PARENT TRANSPORTATION

Parents may transport **only** their **own** student to extra-curricular activities during school hours. During **non-instructional** hours, in order to transport other students, parents **MUST** have on file the proper district required form, and provide proof of current driver's license, current DMV printout, and proof of adequate insurance coverage (\$300,000 liability minimum). All forms must be updated annually. Forms and documentation must be obtained **IN ADVANCE** of the field trip or athletic event. The Field Trip Authorization form is available on the district's web page under district forms.

In addition, parental permission must be obtained in writing for other students wishing to ride with an approved parent. No student will be permitted to ride with a parent who does not have current volunteer **transportation approval**. Volunteer driver forms are available in the school office. This applies only to activities during **non-instructional hours**.

Field trip transportation **during the instructional day** will be limited to either district-owned vehicles or commercial fleet rentals. Transportation for all trips will be limited to: District School Buses, District Vans, Parents driving own children, and Commercial fleet rentals. Students whose parents are not driving to the field trip will need to be transported by district vehicle.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation is a privilege, not a right. You are expected to respect the privilege and follow all transportation rules. You will receive additional information from your driver. **Cost:** Fees may be charged for late buses, athletics, and/or field trips.

Late Bus: Students must purchase late bus passes in advance of activities at the student window, before school or during break only. Only students involved in a school sponsored, after school activity may purchase late bus passes. Students who attend Homework Club will not be charged for the late bus.

Change of Bus Route: Students are expected to ride their regularly scheduled bus route. Students who need to ride a different route **must** have a parent note. Students without a note will not be permitted on a different route.

Emergency Change of Bus Route: Phone calls regarding route changes need to be received by 2:00 p.m., PLEASE!

PARKING LOTS

The upper parking lot has limited space. This area is used for special education busses, deliveries, and staff or visitor parking. Please DO NOT park, double park, or drop off in the upper lot. Please do not block access to this lot









CLOSED CAMPUS

You may leave the campus only with written permission from your parent or guardian. Permission to leave the school grounds during the school day is granted for: doctor/dentist appointments and personal emergencies. Parents/guardians must sign students out in the school office.

ATTENTION PARENTS

DUE TO THE OVERWHELMING AMOUNT OF MESSAGES, **PLEASE LIMIT STUDENT MESSAGES TO EMERGENCIES ONLY.** UNLESS YOU HAVE A MAJOR EMERGENCY, WE ASK THAT YOU PLEASE TALK TO YOUR STUDENT ABOUT APPOINTMENTS OR BUSINESS BEFORE THEY LEAVE FOR SCHOOL. PLEASE **SEND A NOTE** IF THEY WILL BE LEAVING SCHOOL EARLY. *THANK YOU FOR YOUR COOPERATION*

Show concern for your own safety and the safety of others by following the rules listed below:

-  Have your ride meet you in the **lower** parking lot before or after school...do **NOT** use the upper lot unless you are arriving late or leaving early.
-  Walk; don't run (except during P.E.).
-  Do not throw any objects including rocks, pencils, food, etc.
-  Do not carry sharp or hazardous objects.
-  Students may not be in classrooms without a staff member.
-  Remain within established boundaries (i.e. within the orange or yellow lines).
-  Skateboards and skates are not allowed on campus.
-  Use only equipment furnished by or approved by the school and only under the direct supervision of a staff member.

DRUG FREE ZONE

Toyon Middle School is committed to providing a healthy, safe, and productive learning environment. The campus is designated as a "Drug/Alcohol/Tobacco Free Zone". This ban includes all school buildings, campus areas, and vehicles by all persons including employees, students, and visitors attending any activities, athletic events, or meetings. Dogs trained to find drugs, alcohol, and weapons may be randomly used to serve as a deterrent.




LOCKERS

The school does not provide lockers for personal items except in P.E. Students will need backpacks or tote bags to transport personal items to and from school.







PHYSICAL EDUCATION DRESS REGULATIONS

Students are required to wear a Toyon PE shirt and Toyon PE shorts (\$10 each at student window). Jackets and warm-up pants do not have to be Toyon school clothing, and may be worn over PE uniform as needed. NOTE: Shirts may not be altered by cutting, tearing, creating holes, removing sleeves or neckline, or by tying with a knot or rubber band. Students are permitted to write their name ONLY on PE shirts as directed by PE teachers. All other writing on shirts is not permitted.

PE LOCKERS

-  You will be issued a P.E. locker and lock.
-  You are responsible for what is "in" as well as "on" the locker.
-  Locks must be returned at the end of the school year. Damaged or missing locks will require a \$5.00 replacement fee.

PROTECTION OF VALUABLES

-  Students are not permitted to bring electronic equipment such as, but not limited to, iPods, MP3 players, Walkmans, digital cameras, C.D. players and C.D.s, electronic games or devices, lasers, or tapes. Skateboards, or unauthorized sports equipment, collectables, etc. are also not allowed at school.
-  Students who bring electronic equipment to school will have the equipment placed in the administrative office. A parent will need to pick up the equipment. Students may get referrals for bringing electronic equipment to school.
-  Although the school will endeavor in every way possible to protect your property, you must ultimately assume responsibility for your personal property (sweaters, books, musical instruments, etc.)
-  **Toyon assumes no responsibility for lost, stolen, or damaged items.**
-  All personal items should be clearly marked with your name.
-  Students who need to use cell phones for emergencies only, must check in at the office to do so. Students are not allowed to use cell phones without permission from a staff member while at school.

CAMPUS CLEANLINESS

Help keep the campus clean for everyone to enjoy...it's everyone's responsibility!

- ☒ All food and drink must be consumed within the orange lines and disposed of properly. No food or drink is allowed beyond the quad area.
- ☒ Cooperate with the custodians.
- ☒ Recycle...appropriate containers are conveniently located throughout the campus and classrooms.
- ☒ **Do not bring or chew gum at school. Do not bring or eat unshelled sunflower seeds.**

HALL PASSES

It is the student's responsibility to have a pass when out of the classroom during class. Teachers will give you a pass only when it is absolutely necessary. Students without a pass will be considered out of bounds and subject to disciplinary action.

VISITORS

- ☒ Parents/Guardians are invited to visit our campus. Please notify us 24 hours in advance. On the day of the visit, obtain a visitor's pass from the office.
- ☒ Please remember that **Toyon is a "Drug/Alcohol/Tobacco Free Zone."**
- ☒ Students from other schools or any school-age person may not visit during school hours.
- ☒ Loitering on or near the campus will be reported to the office immediately.

PREPARATION FOR CLASS

- ☒ Be thoroughly prepared each day for class by arriving on time and having:
 - ☒ Homework completed
 - ☒ A 3-ring binder (with subject dividers, binder paper, etc.)
 - ☒ Toyon Student planner
 - ☒ A zippered case with pencils, erasers, pen, ruler, protractor (calculators are recommended)
 - ☒ Teachers may require additional supplies for specific classes.

CHECK OUT

- ☒ If you plan to move out of the school area, you will be given a check-out slip to be signed by all of your teachers, the secretary, and the librarian.
- ☒ All books must be returned to the office.
- ☒ School records will be sent to your new school (when requested) after all books are returned and any outstanding fines are paid.

PAYMENT OF FEES

- ☒ Students with outstanding debts may be excluded from participating in activities.
- ☒ A \$25.00 fee will be charged for returned checks, which may then be turned over to the District Attorney's bad check program.
- ☒ Some scholarships are available to help with the cost of activities and/or fees. Students may be assigned "community service" jobs in exchange for the scholarships. Parents must request scholarships in writing to the office before the activity.
- ☒ Please use equipment carefully; damage to equipment due to misuse will be charged to students/parents.

STUDENT PROGRESS REPORTS

Toyon Middle School has four quarter grading periods. Progress reports will be mailed home indicating student achievement approximately four to five weeks into each quarter grading period. **Parents of students receiving a "D" or "F" grade in any class should contact teachers immediately to discuss strategies to improve academic or behavioral performance. TEACHERS WANT STUDENTS TO BE SUCCESSFUL. PLEASE CONTACT THE TEACHERS WHENEVER YOU HAVE QUESTIONS OR CONCERNS REGARDING YOUR STUDENT'S PROGRESS IN CLASSES.** All teachers can be reached by email through the district website: calaveras.k12.ca.us

REPORT CARDS

At the middle and end of each quarter, a "report card" will be mailed home. These grades determine a student's G.P.A. (grade point average) for eligibility in sports, awards, honor roll, and promotion status.

PARENT CONFERENCES

Parent conferences will be **Tuesday and Thursday September 23rd and 25th, 2008, 1:30 to 4:30 pm and 5:30 to 7:00 pm** each day. At this time, parents will have the opportunity to discuss their student's performance in each teacher's class. Parents are encouraged to discuss academic progress with the staff on a regular basis. This parent contact is vital for positive student achievement and is not limited to conference time.

GRADE CHECKS

Students can check on their progress in classes by obtaining a "grade check" form from their homeroom teacher. Students are able to receive grade checks weekly. If students need help in classes, talk with teachers, arrange for a parent-teacher-student meeting, and/or attend homework club sessions after school or on Saturdays (dates available in the office).

ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance will be rewarded. Parents are required to notify the school by phone or by note within 3 days of the absence. After 3 days, the unverified absence will become unexcused. Excused absences include personal illness or injury, medical appointments, death of an immediate family member, court appearances, and observance of a religious holiday. All other reasons for absences are unexcused.

NOTE: Absences for reasons of family vacation are considered unexcused. Saturday school will be offered as make up for students with any absences. Saturday school will be required as make up for students with unexcused absences. Teachers will be required to provide work for any student with excused absences who choose to make up work in Saturday school. It is the option of the teacher to provide make-up work for students with unexcused absences.

Failure to provide verification of excused absences (illness, doctor/dentist appointment, etc.) will result in an unexcused absence. One day of Saturday School will be required for each day of unexcused absence and may lead to a referral to the School Attendance Review Board (S.A.R.B.). Absences exceeding 10% of the instructional time in a particular grade period for any reason may be grounds for failure. Saturday school attendance is considered make up for any type of absence. When a student has had 14 absences in the school year for illness, a physician must verify any further absences for illness.

SATURDAY SCHOOL

Saturday School may be assigned to a student for behavior violations, as well as unexcused or excessive absences. However, students may sign up to attend Saturday School to receive extra help with homework and assignments from a credentialed teacher. Parents are always contacted prior to the student being assigned Saturday School and are informed that their child is to bring schoolwork with them. Parents are responsible for transporting their child to and from Saturday School.

Saturday School is scheduled approximately three times per month from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon. Room assignments for Saturday School are posted near the office door. Students are expected to follow all regular school rules while in attendance. Students who arrive late to Saturday School may not receive credit for their attendance.

PROMOTION

To promote unconditionally, students must achieve "at standard" points based on 4 criteria:

- ☒ Regular attendance (attend no less than 92% of the instructional time)
- ☒ Scores on the reading, writing, and math performance tasks
- ☒ Scores on the California Standardized Tests in language arts and math
- ☒ Academic grades in all classes, especially in language and math classes

STUDENTS WHO ARE AT RISK FOR RETENTION:

- ☒ May participate in a student success team meeting (SST) to brainstorm intervention strategies
- ☒ May be assigned a remediation/intervention class.
- ☒ May be required to attend after school, and/or Saturday School tutoring sessions.

END OF SCHOOL YEAR ACTIVITIES:

- ☒ Awards Acknowledgement
- ☒ Evening dance at Toyon Middle School.
- ☒ 8th grade field trip off site.

DRESS CODE

The simple rule is "dress for success." Come to school prepared to be attentive in class, ready and able to learn. Avoid clothing, accessories, and styles that entertain or distract others and disrupt the educational process. The expression of a student's individuality through dress is sanctioned by the Board. However, restriction on student apparel and grooming while in school or when engaged in a school activity will be imposed whenever the mode of dress:

- ☒ *Creates a safety hazard for students*
- ☒ *Constitutes a serious and unnecessary distraction to the learning process*
- ☒ *Disrupts campus order*
- ☒ *Promotes unhealthy or unsanitary conditions*
- ☒ *Conflicts with the District's philosophy and goals on the prevention of substance abuse and gang activity*

DO NOT WEAR:

- ☒ **Tank tops** (straps must be at least 2 inches wide), **halter-tops**, **crop tops** (no bare midriff), **mesh shirts**, and **other clothing that exposes undergarments. No plunging necklines.**
- ☒ **Clothing that exposes undergarments.**
- ☒ **Clothing and accessories, which are drug, alcohol, tobacco or gang related, contain sexually suggestive messages, or are otherwise offensive.**
- ☒ **Clothes that "sag"** (pants must be worn at the waist and must not be more than 2 inches bigger than the waist size.)
- ☒ **Short clothing:** When a student's arms are fully extended and held at the sides, skirts and shorts must be longer than his/her fingertips.
- ☒ Clothing must be clean and in good repair.
- ☒ Hats, worn correctly (bill forward and straight), may be worn outdoors.
- ☒ Students in violation of the dress code will change into clean physical education clothing.

PARENT STAFF CLUB--PSC

Toyon Middle School has an active PSC and invites all parents to be involved. Joining the PSC shows support for the goals of the parent/staff/student organization and allows for additional programs for students. The PSC generally meets on a monthly basis.

SCHOOL HEALTH INFORMATION

It is very important that our school office know about any chronic illnesses or conditions students have so that we can be prepared for any emergencies that might occur. Please contact our school office to discuss any illnesses or conditions that might cause your student difficulty at school. Generally, office personnel will administer first aid in case of an accident.

In the event of a serious emergency, paramedics will be called first, and parents will be notified as soon as possible. **FAMILY EMERGENCY CARDS MUST BE KEPT UP TO DATE WITH ACCURATE INFORMATION AND PHONE NUMBERS** to enable the school to contact parents promptly. Missing or incorrect phone numbers, as well as phones with blocked numbers, can cause excessive delays. PLEASE DO NOT create a block on the school phone number, as this can cause unnecessary delays.

MEDICATION

Education Code, Section 11753.1 allows schools to assist in the administration of medication prescribed by a student's physician. The medication should be brought to school by a parent in a pharmacy labeled container. In addition, the proper authorization form must be on file in order for medication to be administered by school personnel. These forms are located in the school office. Over the counter medications must also be placed in a pharmacy labeled container and have the proper form on file in order to be administered at school. Students who carry inhalers for asthma must have a physician's order if the inhaler is to be carried with the student at all times.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Officers and representatives will be elected each semester. Representatives must have the ability to work independently as demonstrated by class work, behavior, and attendance. Representatives must: (a) work at or near academic ability, (b) demonstrate good citizenship AND (c) have "at standard" attendance rate (92% or better).

NON-DISCRIMINATION

The Governing Board is committed to equal opportunity for all individuals in education. District programs and activities shall be free from discrimination based on gender, race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, ethnic group, marital or parental status, physical or mental disability, sexual orientation, or the perception of one or more of such characteristics. The Board shall promote programs that ensure that discriminatory practices are eliminated in all district activities.

UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

The Governing Board recognizes that the district is responsible for ensuring that it complies with state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The district shall follow uniform complaint procedures when addressing complaints alleging unlawful discrimination based on ethnic group identification, religion, age, gender, color, or physical or mental disability in any program or activity that receives or benefits from state financial assistance. The district shall also follow uniform complaint procedures when addressing complaints alleging failure to comply with state or federal law in adult basic education, consolidated categorical aid programs, migrant education, vocational education, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, and special education programs. The Board encourages the early, informal resolution of complaints at the site level whenever possible. Parents and students who have a complaint should first contact the site administrators at 754-2137.

STUDENT DISCIPLINE

Students are expected to be courteous to all adults and peers, follow safety precautions, and show concern for others. A student may be suspended or expelled while going to, during, or coming from school or at a school sponsored activity, during the lunch period, whether on or off campus, for any of the acts listed below, including but not limited to:

- Use, possession, or sale of tobacco, alcoholic beverages, narcotics, illegal drugs, or other intoxicants or paraphernalia
- Use or possession of articles, which could be used as weapons (knives, sticks, jaw-breaker rings, etc.)
- Racial or sexual harassment as defined by School Board policy and the Education Code
- Vandalism of school or private property
- Profanity, vulgarity, or obscene acts
- Willful disobedience toward staff members
- Leaving the school grounds without permission of school administrators
- Fighting on the school grounds or on the way to or from school
- Possession or use of firecrackers, incendiaries and/or explosives
- Stealing or receiving stolen property, gambling, forgery, or extortion
- Disrupting school activities or otherwise defying the authority of the school staff

DISCIPLINE PROCESS: POINT SYSTEM

Every effort will be made to resolve behavior issues with as little disruption to the educational process as possible. For extreme or persistent misbehavior, a student will receive a more severe consequence. Discipline Points are assigned for each behavioral offense and are cumulative for the entire year. Students who accumulate 20 points, or students who enter at the end of the 1st semester and accumulate 10 points, will be recommended for involuntary change of placement to an alternative program or for expulsion. The following is a list of consequences for student misbehavior. Please note that consequences may be more severe depending on the offense and the circumstances.

THE FOLLOWING IS A LIST OF CONSEQUENCES FOR RULES VIOLATIONS:

(1) DETENTION AND/OR CLASS SUSPENSION

Inappropriate classroom behavior	Electronic device at school	Excessive tardies (as defined by teacher)

MANDATORY RECOMMENDATION FOR EXPULSION

Unless the principal, Superintendent or designee finds that expulsion is inappropriate due to particular circumstances, the principal, Superintendent or designee shall recommend a student's expulsion for any of the following acts: (Education Code 48915 (a)).

- ☒ Causing serious physical injury to another person, except in self-defense
- ☒ Possession of any knife as defined in Education Code 48915(g), explosive or other dangerous object of no reasonable use to the student
- ☒ Unlawful possession of any controlled substance, as listed in Health and Safety Code 11053-11058
- ☒ Robbery or extortion
- ☒ Assault or battery, as defined in Penal Code 240 and 242, upon any school employee

MANDATORY RECOMMENDATION AND MANDATORY EXPULSION

The principal, Superintendent or designee shall recommend that the Board expel any student found at school or at a school activity to be: (Education Code 48915 (c))

- ☒ Possessing, as verified by a district employee, or selling or otherwise furnishing a firearm, unless the student had obtained prior written permission to possess the item from a certificated school employee, with the principal or designee's concurrence.
- ☒ Brandishing a knife as defined in Education Code 48915 (g) at another person
- ☒ Unlawfully selling a controlled substance listed in Health and Safety Code 11053-11058
- ☒ Committing or attempting to commit a sexual assault or committing a sexual battery as defined in item #14 under "Grounds for Suspension and Expulsion" above
- ☒ Possessing an explosive as defined in 18 USC 921

Upon finding that the student committed any of the above acts, the Board shall expel the student. (Education Code 48915)

SCHOOL PROCEDURE FOR THE ACCUMULATION OF DISCIPLINE POINTS

STEP 1: AT THE ACCUMULATION OF 5 POINTS:

Parent/Guardian will be notified by telephone, note, or mail.

STEP 2: AT THE ACCUMULATION OF 10-12 POINTS:

☒ An Administrator/Parent /Student Conference, by phone or in person, will be held. The student will be warned of more serious disciplinary action if behavior continues. A behavior contract may be developed at this time, and a School Attendance Review Board (SARB) letter will be sent if appropriate.

OR

☒ A Student Success Team Meeting (SST) - School staff will schedule an SST meeting of student, parent/guardian, teachers, and/or an administrator. The meeting will include discussions about the student's academic standing, career planning, discipline, and attendance. Consequences will include the development or evaluation of a site level behavior contract. In addition, a warning will be given regarding a possible change of placement or expulsion and a possible SARB referral.

STEP 3: AT THE ACCUMULATION OF 20 POINTS OR UPON VIOLATION OF SITE LEVEL CONTRACT:

The student and parent/guardian will meet with the District Disciplinary Review Panel, a site administrator, and a representative of alternative education to create a plan to help the student be successful and to review the student's behavioral contract. Change of placement or possible expulsion will be considered.
